Reminder Spring Break 2019 April 1-5

Please keep in mind as you make any travel arrangements, this year Spring Break is April 1-5, 2019.

Clubs Provide Enriching Activities for Students

Extra-curricular activities can take many forms for students at Monroe Public Schools. Not only are there abundant opportunities for students to participate in competitive athletics, there are also a variety of clubs for students at all grade levels.

At Monroe High School, there are 36 different clubs that students can join in a variety of interest areas. From art to autos to books to entrepreneurship, students have many choices. Monroe High School even has a Fishing Club! Meeting each week on Tackle Box Tuesdays, the MHS Fishing Club has competed in high school fishing tournaments throughout the state of Michigan, Ohio, and Pennsylvania.

"Fishing at Monroe HS has created a positive community for our student-anglers," said Assistant Principal and club advisor Michael Foley. "Our club focuses on team work, acceptance, building community, and exploring the outdoors."

At Custer Elementary, there are seven student clubs that meet after school on different days of the week. From Story Book STEM to Math Games to Global Problems, Reader's Theater and Word Study, clubs aren't just for high school students. Custer even boasts of a School Beautification Club at which students are painting works of art on the ceiling tiles and will even paint a mural in the gymnasium

"The school beautification club gives students the opportunity to truly make a change at our school," said Custer School Improvement Coach Danielle Jozwiak. "They have a voice in what we do, and get to explore their love for art while using it to express themselves."

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10th Induction Ceremony for the Monroe High School Athletic Hall of Fame

Six athletes, a teacher/coach and an entire basketball team were honored at the 10th Induction Ceremony for the MHS Athletic Hall of Fame on November 30, 2018.

Inductees included Larry Aaron, for his skill as member of the 1978-1979 Men's Basketball team; Art Eversole, for his speed on the track/cross country team from 1953-1956; Debbie Chavis Laney for her athleticism as a member of the Varsity Softball Team from 1988-1990; Coach Marlene Rex, a teacher and coach from 1957-1993, she started the Flamingo Synchronized Swimming Club, leading MHS to the state championship in 1991 and 1992 among many other accomplishments; Tom Salow Jr., a gifted baseball player from 1982-1984; Ray Stein, 1931 state pole vaulting champion; Sarah Howe Waidelich, who scored 1,001 career points in Women's basketball from 2003-2006; and the 1976 Men's Basketball Team, touted as the best basketball team ever assembled in school history.



Monroe High School Vocal Arts, Band and Orchestra Entertain Monroe

Monroe Public Schools continues to showcase its excellence in band, orchestra and vocal arts this year. During its Prefestival concert on Thursday February 21, the MHS Band and Orchestra entertained a large audience with its abundance of student talent in preparation for its March 7 and 8 Michigan School Band and Orchestra Association Festival. Monroe High School hosted 2,000 singers at the Michigan School Vocal Music Association Middle School Festival on March 1 and 2. Guests were treated to performances every 15 minutes, including several from MHS and MMS. All Monroe groups gave very solid performances and three qualified to move on to the state choral festival in Brighton on May 1-3.

Monroe High School Adds New CTE and AP Courses

Beginning in the Fall of 2019, Monroe High School will be offering 10 new Career and Technical Education classes, as well as four new Advanced Placement classes for students.

In the career area of Education Foundations, two new courses titled Education Occupations 1 and Education Occupations 2 will provide students with an introduction to the unique characteristics of the child, develops respect for children, and guidance skills that help them grow and develop. The student will gain knowledge that enables him/her to decide whether working in the field of education is a suitable, personal career goal and will expand knowledge of the teaching field.

Two courses in Multi-Media and Broadcasting will be offered, titled TV/ Multimedia Broadcasting 1 and 2. These courses will provide a fundamental understanding of production principles and experience with the video camera, lighting instruments and techniques, microphones, script creation and basic editing. Students will perform assignments both on-camera and off-camera in the studio as well as in the control room. Additionally, students will learn program development, field production and crew job skills.

Drones will be introduced through the addition of four new courses in the Electro-Mechanical Program area. Fundamentals of Drones and



Robotics Systems 1, Drone Design and **Commercial Drone Operations 2, Drone** Applications 3, and Drone Theory 4 will introduce students to the world of **Unmanned Aerial** Systems. Students will be taught the basics from electrical systems, to circuitry and design through preparation for the FFA Part 107 Exam,

and the Remote Pilot Certification. Internships and support in developing a small business will also be included.

Students interested in expanding their knowledge and experience with Computer Networking and Cyber Security will be able to enroll in Computer Networking & Cyber Security 3 and 4. These courses will prepare individuals to assess the security needs of computer and network systems, recommend secure solutions, and manage the implementation



and maintenance of security devices, systems, and procedures leading to higher levels of secure network management and design.

"We need to remember that not every student plans to attend college," said CTE Director Steve Pollzzie. "With robust CTE course offerings, we can help students get the training they need to be job ready right after high school, or to pursue more education and training should they choose."

New AP course offerings include a course in Environmental Science, providing students with a deep dive into understanding the interrelationships of the natural world. The new Psychology course will build on students' knowledge of the systematic and scientific study of the behavior and mental processes of human beings and other animals.

Finally, two advanced courses in visual arts; 2-D Portfolio Development, in which students will create 2-D artworks for three required portfolio sections, and 3-D Portfolio Development in which students will create 3-D artworks for three required portfolio sections will be offered.

Advanced Placement courses offer students rigor and helps develop an understanding of the time management, study skills and independent learning needed for the demands of college.


