

2019 SET SEG Safety Is No Accident Winner

SET SEG Loss Control Representative Skip Barclay presented their 2019 Safety Is No Accident Award to Dr. Julie Everly, Superintendent, and Kathy Eighmey, Executive Director of Business and Finance.

The award recognized Monroe Public Schools' outstanding performance in implementing exemplary safety measures in the school district. MPS had zero claims in the past year.



Security Equipment Upgrades Funded by \$168K Safety Grant

Monroe Public Schools are safer than ever following the August installation of new security equipment. A \$168,583 Competitive School Safety Grant enabled MPS to purchase new audio-video intercom systems and to nearly double the number of doors in the district that utilize electronic locks.

The increased control over building access allowed the district to move from building keys to badges. All doors can now be secured at all times. There is no need to prop them for recess or at any other time, because staff can access them with the badges. In the event of a crisis, the new technology also enables the district to grant law enforcement remote access to their system.

"As a district, we have been proactive utilizing technology to secure entrance to our schools and buildings," Superintendent Dr. Julie Everly stated. "We had already implemented single access buzzer systems and cameras. The grant allowed us to accelerate our security plans."

International Baccalaureate Boosts Raisinville Enrollment

Enrollment is up more than 5.5% over last year at Raisinville Elementary, the only school in Monroe County which offers the International Baccalaureate Primary Years Programme.

"The International Baccalaureate has generated interest in Raisinville and our programs," Principal Scott Hoppert said. "As our students express excitement about the activities they are engaged in, our parents and community are taking notice."

PYP encompasses a transdisciplinary framework that focuses on the development of the whole child as an inquirer and teaches children to inquire about the world around them, actively involving them in the learning process.

Trojan Build II

Closing was held in September on the first Trojan Build house constructed by Monroe High School students, and the exterior work is already completed on the program's second home.

Trojan Build II is approximately 1,650 square feet and will feature 2.5 baths, 3 bedrooms, a full basement, a spacious front porch, and a rear deck when it is completed.

The innovative construction projects involve MHS students building the entire home from the ground up. Students frame, add roofing and siding, set windows and doors, trim, do drywall, lay flooring, and build cabinets. Professionals install plumbing, electrical, and HVAC, but the students are responsible for everything else.

The blueprint is also student-created. The winning design from the Monroe County CAD and Architecture Design competition is selected for the builds.

The success of the first project has generated excitement in the community and increased enrollment in the program. Trojan Build II has a team of 45 students, up from 34 last year.


CTE Welding Ambassadors

The 2019-2020 group includes 14 MPS students in grades 6-12.

Expanded Meal Programs Benefit Students

Monroe Public Schools began offering free breakfast and lunch to all of the district's students in Fall, 2018. Student participation in both meals increased significantly in the first year. The number of breakfasts served daily grew 8%, and the number of daily lunches jumped from 2,934 to 3,685, an increase of 25%.

MPS continues to look for additional opportunities to expand nutritional offerings for students. An afterschool snack program now supports extended day program offerings at all schools.

In September, in partnership with the YMCA, MPS began serving free dinners at Arborwood North and Waterloo to support new grant-funded afterschool programs.

Dinners are also being piloted at Monroe High School. 1,200 dinners were served district-wide in October, about 68 per day.
