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

MHS National Merit Students





Two Monroe High School seniors have received National Merit honors through the 2021 NMSQT Scholarship Program.

Emma Scznsny and Jackson Taft are being recognized for their performance on the 2019 PSAT/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test. The test was administered to over 1.5 million juniors around the nation. Emma scored in the top 2% and has been named a National Merit Commended Student. Monroe Public Schools Early Middle College

Twenty-five students enrolled in the inaugural year of Monroe Public Schools Early Middle College program. Registration is now underway for the 2021-22 school year.

The free, five-year program enables students to graduate with both their high school diploma and an associate degree or industry certification.

EMC is a partnership with Monroe County Community College. EMC students will take college courses onsite at Monroe High School and on the MCCC campus.

The MPS program allows students to earn college credit while participating in high school experiences including school dances and extracurricular activities.

Students receive support services from high school counselors and college advisors who help them to accomplish their individualized pathways and make sure the classes they select count for the degree they have chosen.

MHS Presents Lotus Leaf Live , Weekly Online Student News Broadcast

Every Friday morning, students and staff at Monroe High School are greeted by anchors Samantha Drougel and Chancey Boyce, bringing them news, wherever they are, on computers, tablets, and smart phones.

Lotus Leaf Live is broadcast weekly on Facebook and YouTube. The student news program provides a mix of school, community, state, and national news in 15 minutes or less, with sports highlights, editorials, features, and live interviews.

Last year, the MHS student newsletter evolved into Lotus Leaf Media Outlet. It now features an online flip format, social media channels, broadcasts, and podcasts, integrated into a single hub at lotusleaflive.com. At the start of the 2020-21 school year, the broadcast news program made the leap from a pre-recorded video format to a live production.

"I learned how to plan, set up equipment, and perform a live broadcast in one week," Drougel said. The MHS junior serves as chief editor, broadcast producer, anchor, and supervising editor of broadcasting and podcasting.

Her co-anchor Boyce is also a scriptwriter and the *Lotus Leaf* web editor. "I enjoy being able to express myself, write opinion articles about topics I care about, and have fun on the broadcast," the senior journalist said.

Lotus Leaf Live is not only viewed anywhere, it can also be created anywhere. During fully-remote learning transitions, green screens at the anchors' homes enable the side-by-side live broadcast to continue.

The students have learned how much work goes into creating live broadcasts. "Watching the broadcast, you only see the two anchors talking. Behind the cameras, there's around seven of us," senior Maya Kasprzak said.

Grant Funds Intervention & Enrichment Afterschool Programming at Arborwood & Waterloo

In spring, 2019, Monroe Public Schools was awarded a \$1.35 million 21st Century Community Learning Grant to provide extended day and summer learning programs at Arborwood and Waterloo. The highly competitive state grant from the Michigan Department of Education is funding specialized afterschool programming at the two elementary schools, including reading and math intervention supports, career interest exploration, enrichment opportunities, guest speakers, and community field trips.

The program runs Monday through Thursday, for 2.5 hours after school, serving students in grades 1-6. Navarre Gilbert, the district's program director, said it has been well-received by students and families. "We are providing meaningful learning activities, as well as math and literacy intervention. Our students are experiencing something that is educational, but looks different in its format from the school day."

Originally offered as a focused learning initiative for small groups of students at both schools, remote learning technology during the pandemic has expanded programming building-wide at each site.

The career exploration component is based on Michigan's career pathways model. Recent guest speakers included a nurse, a respiratory therapist, a children's author, a firefighter, and a playwright.

Michigan State University Extension Center, a program partner, provides family education and offered a Parent Workshop Series in January.

On behalf of the Franklin Covey Education Team, it is with great pleasure that we announce **Manor Elementary School** has been recertified as a Lighthouse School.


Lighthouse recertification is achieved only when a school shows sustainable evidence of growth and innovation within the Leader in Me Framework.

Creating Online Resources Digital Notebooks Engage Students

MPS teachers developed a digital library of online lessons and activities for their students and colleagues using Google Slides. The interactive notebooks are accessible anywhere and help guide students through project-based learning, units of study, and individualized work and goals.

Brittney Maczala and Heide Kucharski worked on third grade English Language Arts, replacing the traditional paper journals that are passed back and forth to teachers for feedback. They focused on making them engaging. The notebooks they created feature pre-recorded videos of them teaching lessons, links to online content needed for assignments, and a Table of Contents with hyperlinks.

"They are super-duper easy to use, and I can type and then go back over things," third grader Ian Golding said. "I really like the way they are set up."

MPS Teacher Leads National Webinars

Tech Training for American Educators

MPS teacher Ellen Brooks has been providing educational technology training to thousands of U.S. teachers as a facilitator and coordinator for a National Education Association (NEA) webinar series focused on strategies to help teachers with remote learning.

Brooks is a sixth grade teacher at Custer Elementary and an alumnus of Raisinville Elementary and Monroe High School. Before getting hired at Monroe Public Schools two years ago, she taught five years in Ann Arbor Public Schools. Chris Thomas, an AAPS colleague, reached out to her when he began developing the technology webinar series to support NEA and Michigan Education Association efforts. Brooks and Thomas had served together as technology facilitators, training educators in Ann Arbor and presenting at state conferences.

"Effective Teaching with Ed Tech: A Member-to-Member MEA Webinar series" has reached educators from all 50 states. At the end of September, the series had already helped 20,000 teachers.

Brooks has been thrilled to share her technology expertise with other educators. "It's an honor to be part of it," she said.

Now, as a coordinator, she is also helping to screen and support other presenters.

Building Homes, Building Community





Trojan Build III

COVID-19 has complicated the building process, but adapting to CDC guidelines is just another real-world experience for the Monroe High School construction program. Small crews are scheduled on alternate days for social distancing, and teachers Tom Bell and Andrew Marchese wear GoPro hands-free video cameras to live stream to students at home.

The innovative Trojan Build projects involve MHS students building entire homes from the ground up. Students frame, add roofing and siding, set windows and doors, trim, do drywall, lay flooring, and build cabinets.

Trojan Build III will incorporate Alexa – virtual assistant artificial intelligence technology – and smart home features. Smart kitchen appliances will be donated by Whirlpool, the program's newest partner. Stoneco at Denniston Quarry, a three-year partner, donated 300 tons of stone for the foundation, driveway base, and backfill.

"We value the partnerships with Whirlpool and Stoneco as well as the support of the Home Builders Association and local businesses who have contributed to the program's success," Superintendent Dr. Julie Everly said. "Monroe residents share our pride in what our students are creating. We are building more than homes; we are building community." The innovative Trojan Builds provide students with hands-on experience constructing houses from the ground up, while creating beautiful homes for community residents.





Building Their Futures

Monroe High School's Construction Program is building strong futures for students and alumni.

The recent graduates highlighted here are on the road to success. Although their post-high school paths are different, they share serious work ethics, a commitment to their career goals, and strong roots in MHS construction classes.

Jazlyn Clark took automotive, welding, and machining classes in addition to construction. "Don't limit yourself to one class," Jazlyn advises. "You never know what you might like, and those skills will always stay with you."

Apprenticeships require serious commitment — 800 hours of class time and 8,000 hours on the job. Jace Clark suggests students explore their options in high school. Like Jazlyn, he graduated from MHS with knowledge and experience in multiple trades areas. "My CTE instructors helped me find out who I want to be," Jace said.


