United Way Celebrates Everyday Heroes MPS Employees Honored for Community Service

Two Monroe Public Schools employees were honored as Everyday Heroes by the United Way of Monroe and Lenawee Counties for making a significant difference in the community. Kyle Reed was recognized as the Labor Union Hero, and **Ed Ready** was named Volunteer of the Year.

Mr. Ready, an MPS teacher and interventionist, was recognized for tutoring kids at Paula's House. The long-term transition home allows women in recovery from substance abuse to bring their minor children. When COVID-19 hit and the children were out of school, the moms struggled to help their children with homework and keep them on track. Lisa Young, Operations Manager, said Mr. Ready came all times of the day and got the kids hooked up with their electronics. "He was really committed to trying to help them and keep their lives as normal as possible in a situation that was not normal at all," Young stated.

"I'm not sure that Mr. Ready realizes what a miracle it was that he came to us," Director Paula Whitman expressed. "The population of women that we work with and the children – and what they have been through – they are not used to having people run to them. They are used to having people give up on them, and he never has. "

Kyle Reed is an electro-mechanical design teacher at Monroe High School, who teaches students to design, fly, and repair drones. When the pandemic closed school buildings in the spring, he converted

his classroom into a production space to create face shields, using the district's fleet of 3D printers. More than 12,000 face shields were distributed to medical and frontline workers across southeast Michigan.

Mr. Reed thanked the individuals and companies that came together to make the face shield project happen. He also expressed his appreciation to Superintendent Dr. Julie Everly and the MPS Board of Education for supporting the process, the Community Foundation of Monroe, and all who contributed.

"Monroe Public Schools believes in supporting the community that supports us," Dr. Everly said. "Mr. Reed and Mr. Ready exemplify our core values of enriching our community and acting in service for all. They are wonderful role models for our students, and I am proud of the positive impact they have made in Monroe."

Rotary Transforms Space for MHS Trojan Outfitters

Through the generous donation of funds and hard work from the Rotary Club of Monroe, the clothing closet at Monroe High School has been transformed into MHS Trojan Outfitters.

The clothing is displayed on beautiful new fixtures, there is plenty of storage, and there is even a new private dressing room. Although it now looks like a traditional retail store, the "MHS Trojan Outfitters" features a variety of donated clothing and personal hygiene items provided free for students who need them.



Don Lieto spearheaded the Rotary project which began while he was President. Rotarian Kim Diven, who was also the MHS School Improvement Specialist, saw a need and suggested it. Rotarians Bruce Diven and architect Mark Kohler met with him to explore solutions. The old room was small and stuffed, with many items stored in boxes and crates. The high school allocated a larger room, and the Rotary donated walls, fixtures, paint, labor, sweatpants, shirts, leggings, and hygiene products. Kohler procured the partition. The walls were built in Lieto's garage, and Dave and Joy Bagnell assisted him with painting. COVID-19 limited participation in painting and installation, but the entire organization was supportive of the initiative and pleased with the outcome. "We wanted to make it a welcoming space, where students would feel comfortable going," Lieto said, "and we gave them a place where they would like to shop."

The new space is located in D227, near the Student Services Office. Student Service Providers Ellen Ivey, Jamila Clark, and Naomi Stoner oversee operations and will take students down to "shop the merchandise." Everything is free; the items are provided to those who need them at no cost.

Knabush Center Holds Clean-Up Day

The Knabusch Center hosted a Clean-Up Day on April 24th. Student volunteers picked up litter and debris, built bird houses, assembled pinecone feeders, and placed food and birdseed on the trails.

This was the first year for the event which was funded by a \$750 Global Youth Services Day grant from the Michigan Community Service Commission. Monroe County youth helped a beloved outdoor community space, celebrated Earth Day, and had fun.

New Equipment for MHS CTE Programs

Anatomage Table Provides Virtual Dissection Experience



Imagine an iPad the size of a dining room table. That's how Kari Arnold, who teaches Health Occupation at Monroe High School, described the exciting new equipment her students will be using next fall.

The new Anatomage Table is a 3D anatomy visualization tool that uses advanced technology and images to enable users to do virtual dissection. Students will be able to examine individual body systems and view both healthy bodies and various pathologies.

The life-size table will connect to the program's existing LCD projectors for lectures and can be used lying flat (as pictured) or tipped upright.


State funds allocated for career training enabled MPS to purchase new equipment for Monroe High School's CTE programs that will expand learning opportunities and improve program services.

Scissor Rack for Auto Tech

A new Hunter Scissor Rack for the MHS Career Technical Education Automotive Lab connects to the alignment system that was purchased two years ago. The drive-on lift is flush-mount to the floor and features two 6,000-pound capacity swing airjacks to support a 10,000-pound vehicle.

The new system will provide students experience with equipment that is currently used in the automotive industry and that aligns with the National Automotive Technicians Education Foundation (NATEF) standards.

"This is what makes the MHS automotive technology program unique," teacher Bryan Zamorski stated. "Our students get the opportunity to use some of the most advanced equipment and become better prepared for the automotive industry straight out of high school."



The floor in the automotive technology lab was excavated to provide a precise fit for the new alignment pit system.



A Telescoping Boom with a 34-foot reach was purchased for the Construction Trades program. The versatile off-road machine will be beneficial in many construction phases at the Trojan Build site, enabling students to safely lift heavy loads and do some work that previously required outside assistance. Teacher Thomas Bell said the new equipment will also enable seniors in MHS construction, welding, and automotive programs to become certified for telescoping and forklifts. "This will be another unique opportunity MHS students have that is not available anywhere else in our county," he stated.
