# Superintendent **Dr. Julie Everly**

# **A Lasting Legacy**

Thousands of Lives **Touched Through Decades of Service** 



Superintendent Dr. Julie Everly will retire from Monroe Public Schools in mid-August. She has led the district since 2017 and has devoted her life to educating MPS students.

"Monroe Public Schools are stronger than we have ever been," Dr. Everly proclaimed. "Over the past five years, we have collaborated with education and business partners to create new opportunities for students, invested in equipment and technology to enhance learning experiences, and passed a \$60 million bond that is transforming district schools."

"We are exceptionally proud of what we have achieved together," Board Vice President Larry Zimmerman said, "and we will be looking for someone who will continue the momentum."

Under Dr. Everly's leadership, MPS launched its Early Middle College, the International Baccalaureate program at Raisinville, and district-wide entrepreneurial curriculum. In 2019, MPS was awarded a \$1.3 million grant for afterschool and enrichment programming at Arborwood and Waterloo. Career technical education programs have evolved and expanded. The new initiatives are designed to engage every learner and help students achieve their goals. "Every decision we make is student-focused," Dr. Everly said. "Students are the reason I entered education."

Dr. Everly got her start at MPS in 1993 as a Kids Club caregiver while working on undergraduate studies. She earned four degrees from Eastern Michigan, including her Ph.D. in Educational

Leadership. In 1995, MPS hired her to teach at Manor Elementary. She was named Principal at Raisinville Elementary in 2003 and Arborwood Elementary in 2009. Since 2011, Dr. Everly has been critically involved in daily operations and decisions impacting the district's 5,000 students, serving as Assistant Superintendent of Curriculum and Human Resources, Deputy Superintendent, and the district's first female Superintendent.

"Dr. Everly's legacy lies within the lives of the more than 20,000 students she has touched as administrator and teacher," Mr. Zimmerman said.















Monroe High School's Construction Trades program celebrated the completion of its third student-built house on June 7th with an Open House and ribbon-cutting ceremony.

Dr. Julie Everly, Superintendent, and instructors Tom Bell and Andrew Marchese, thanked project partners and student families for their support. Special mention was given to the Monroe County Home Builders Association for guidance, and to sponsors Stoneco for donating the stone product, and Whirlpool for donating the home's appliances.

# **Cybersecurity Pilot Program** Launching in Fall, 2022

Monroe High School will pilot new Cybersecurity career technical education courses during the 2022-2023 school year. If the pilot is successful, Cybersecurity will become a new CTE program.

Cybersecurity is a rapidly growing high-wage, high-demand career field. "This is a great addition to our program offerings and has a high level of student interest," Leah Morelli, CTE Director stated. More than 100 MHS students requested the courses for next year and will learn the basics of cybersecurity.

"Once the program is state-approved and fully implemented, students will be able to earn industry credentials that will be a fantastic foundation for a career in this exciting field," Mrs. Morelli said.


# Paramedic of the Year

# **Student Board of Delegates**

A new voice in district issues, decisions



A new leadership opportunity for the district's students launched in 2022 the Monroe Public Schools Student **Board of Delegates.** 

The new group is comprised of students, grades 4-12, representing every school in the district. Superintendent, Dr. Julie Everly, meets monthly with the delegates to gain student perspective and insight on key issues.

"The Student Board is designed to amplify student voice, creating a forum where students can share ideas and ensure student needs are heard and addressed," Dr. Everly explained. "It is also an opportunity for students to strengthen their leadership and communication skills."

During the group's first meeting, increasing the number of water filling stations in the district's schools emerged as a top priority. At subsequent meetings, the students formed subgroups, completed research, and identified benefits in three areas — environment, health, and school. The delegates made a formal presentation to the MPS Board of Education at the June 14th meeting, requesting that the district purchase 13 water filling stations. The Board passed the students' motion unanimously. Installation is planned to take place over the summer.

Future priorities include revisiting the student dress code and increasing handicap accessibility. The Student Board will resume meeting in the fall.




